Pastor Ponders

There is a scene in one of my favorite movie "Crimson Tide" in which Denzel Washington plays the executive officer and secondin-command to the captain on a nuclear submarine. The crew's mission is to patrol the South China Sea and respond to a possible Russian nuclear strike. On their way to their destination, a fire breaks out in the galley. While the XO and the fire brigade try to put it out, the captain of the submarine initiates a missile drill for the entire crew. The drill is conducted and the fire is brought under control. Afterward, the executive confronts the captain about the wisdom of calling for a drill during a potential ship-wide disaster. The captain says, "I believe a crisis is the best time to run a drill. Do you think we accomplish our mission only when things are hunky-dory?"

During these times, when our country is facing a number of crises, from the pandemic, to the economic downturn, to the racial unrest and the protest movements, this is a time for the church to be faithful to its mission. We will not let the crisis "put us on hold" as we wait for better times. We will not simply wait until things are "hunky-dory" again in order to fulfill God's mission in the world. This may be the best time to move forward in mission.

These are times that test our faith -- who we are, what we are about, and most importantly, what God is calling us to be. This is a time in which the light Christ and the good news of God's redemptive work in the world needs to be shown and proclaimed. Instead of hanging back and waiting for better times ahead, perhaps God is

opening doors for us to explore new ways in which His mission will be accomplished. I believe that this is exactly the time during which God will open to us new ministry opportunities for us, both now and in the short term and in the long term.

Faith is can be relatively easy when life seems certain and almost predictable in the hunkydory times; however, Christ never promised his disciples that the road to Jerusalem would be without pain or that they would find self-fulfillment at the end of the road. Like the disciples in Jesus' time and like Israelites in the wilderness during the Exodus, we are promised a life of the Spirit, led by God who travels with us even in the most uncertain times. As a church we always try to discern just how and where the Holy Spirit is leading us, if we have the courage to explore the opportunities that God presents to us.

Who knows where the Spirit will lead and what we may envision our mission may be in these days, but in all things, we trust the Lord is showing us the way, especially in these wilderness times. Let us then live out our faith in a world that will test our resolve but also deepen our commitment to God's mission for us in the world.

High School Blessings: Rest and Family Time



Fellow Disciples,

I pray this news finds you well and healthy in these times. Following are highlights from the July 13 council meeting.

President Report

- Work is underway with Groth Design Group on developing a long-term master plan for St.
 John's. As I write, Groth was finishing up a building inspection of the mechanicals, electrical, and plumbing.
- I invite you to consider hosting a Small Neighborhood Gathering. Another way to connect in these times of social and physical distancing. Contact the office to sign up.
- There was discussion on how to maintain a constant uniformed vision with new ministries underway (Stewardship for All Seasons, Transition Team, and Groth Design).
- The Council approved to explore the possibility of collaborating with Gethsemane Lutheran on Greenfield Ave. Backstory: Pastor Karen Natterstad currently serves as the interim pastor at Gethsemane and with her prior connection to St. John's she felt there would be an opportunity for St. John's and Gethsemane to work together. The goal of this exploration is to answer the discovery process questions and conclude the possibility of future collaboration.

Financial Report

- The general giving for June was down; hopefully an anomaly. The overall financials remain in good shape.
- Recommended and approved \$30,000 be transferred to the Stewardship for All Season (SAS) initiatives

Transition team

- The team continues to monitor and review local health data and guidelines.
- We are in the process of rescheduling the June Annual Congregational meeting to late August or September. Stay tuned for more details.
- In August, outdoor worship (weather dependent) will be available every Sunday at 8:30 & 10:00, and on Wednesdays @ 6:30.
- Current efforts are centered around the logistics of safely holding an indoor worship.

Growing In Hospitality and Mission by Caring for God's House by Pastor Brian Halverson

As I wrote in my "Pastor's Ponderings," we are always exploring and creating a vision for St. John's Lutheran Church. I should better say that God has a vision for our church and we are continually exploring the possibilities of new ministries as well as strengthening the ministries we currently have in order to further the mission of God's church in the world.

One of these opportunities specifically identified last year as a priority through the Moving the Mission Forward Together stewardship initiative, is to look at the overall building and church grounds design and usages. It is essential that, as a congregation, we look forward while at the same time assessing the current situation. Change is a constant part of our lives, so it is important to ask: how have things changed for us over the last 20 years, 30 years, 50 years? How will things change over the next 10, 15, 20 years? Are we able to adapt to the changes while still maintaining the core of who we are as a church community? And finally, what is our overall plan that will guide us now and in the future?



To help us answer these questions we have engaged an architectural consulting firm Groth Design Group to help us assess where we are now in the utilization of our building and grounds and how they are used to support our current ministry. Working with an appointed Task Force and with all of you, their work will provide us with an overall, comprehensive building and grounds design that will include not only ideas about redesigning and upgrading our interior space, but also to assessing mechanical and electrical conditions of our building.

A comprehensive plan will enable us to enhance, improve, and upgrade our building usage space in a more planned and managed way.

Groth Design Group began its work with a walk through of the

property on July 24. Going forward, their work will include small group and a congregational meeting to hear your ideas and passions about who we are, what we are about, and what you envision St. John's to be now and in the future. The final plan, which will take approximately three months to complete, will bring together the input received and their assessment and expertise, providing a possible roadmap for stewarding and equipping our building and

property for years to come.

The goal of this work is to care for and steward a property that will house and support God's mission in and through this church: serving our members, welcoming the seekers, reaching out in service so that people will continually be fed by the Gospel of Jesus Christ and sent into the world by the Holy Spirit who enlivens us all. I am grateful for your thoughtful participation in this process as it moves forward. And, as always, if you have specific questions, please don't hesitate to reach out to me or members of the Task Force: Tim Tollander, Gail Rennie, Jan Delzer, Dick Granholm, Cindy Schaefer, Jeff Gubbins, and Marion Schreiber.
