### Congregational Meeting Minutes - January 29, 2023

- 1. 11:45, call to order by President Brian Zach, opening prayer
- 2. Thank yous
- 3. Approval of today's agenda; Jeremy Beyerlein 1<sup>st</sup>, 2<sup>nd</sup> from Chuck Klawitter, no questions, voted approval
- 4. Approval of minutes from June 5, 2022; Sandy Paukner 1<sup>st</sup>, 2<sup>nd</sup> from Jerry Hanson, no discussion, voted approval
- 5. Treasurer's Report presented by Brian; Keith Paukner 1<sup>st</sup>, Patrice Krimpelbein 2<sup>nd</sup>, no discussion, voted approval
- 6. Brian presented unfinished business: Call committee; Kathy Davis 1<sup>st</sup>, Jeremy Beyerlein 2<sup>nd</sup>, no discussion, voted approval
- 7. Brian presented Groth design update; reiterated original focus; price for large project got excessive, focusing this year on painting exterior, working on exterior signage w/ digital, addressing circle drive
  - a. Received some quotes, continuing to vet things out
  - b. Painting exterior estimate \$25K (5-7 years of longevity); biggest priority at this point due to deterioration; requires replacement of rotted wood, not just paint, all included in the \$25K quote
  - c. Signage estimate \$50K-60K, including other areas, neon signage included; goal to also have signage on Davidson for those coming from east end, does not include interior signage
  - d. Circle drive estimate \$80K-\$100K, includes circle drive and light poles in that area
    - i. Charged rent by WeEnergies for light poles, we pay them for maintenance, and we want to put in our own LEDs
    - ii. Need to keep the footprint that we currently have due to access for fire dept
    - iii. Extract and put down the same footprint is goal at this point
  - e. Plan would ask \$1,000 of each giving unit
  - f. Focus is to get these initiatives done this year without taking it from the Capital Improvement fund or budget; plan is to get concrete numbers, then release info to everyone & have a campaign strategy at that point
  - g. Question about money for signage from 60th Anniversary; 10K+ is there for signage
- 8. New business presented by Brian
  - a. No audit this year, as we're still converting from QB to PC
  - b. Goal is for the completion this year
- 9. Committee Finance Reports presented by Brian; Kathy Davis 1<sup>st</sup>, Phil Lange 2<sup>nd</sup>, voted and approved
- 10. Election of nominating committee; Jeremy Beyerlein 1<sup>st</sup>, Lizzie Roth 2<sup>nd</sup>; Mark addressed error in handout, should be 2023-2024 council, voted and approved

  - a. explanation of where giving goes

- b. pointed out designated giving and giving unit change over the years, and that giving units have decreased, but actual giving has increased overall
- 12. Brian presented 2023 Budget (Brittany Larson took over minutes at this point)
  - a. Salaries and compensation: At 59% of total budget within Synod recommendation and fully staffed.
  - b. Caring and sharing: Reduction because this area is self-sustaining through good will donations.
    - i. Congregant question Question about status of full-time associate pastor: Brian said it is on hold because the budget does not show we can afford it as a long-term continual expense.
    - ii. Congregant question What are the attendance numbers for church: Brian said he did not review these numbers. Brian will investigate getting these numbers and publishing them.
    - iii. Congregant question Are the stewardship numbers going up per giving unit? Brian said he does not look at giving unit individual numbers. A letter was sent out in late 2022 to help encourage reflection and possible increase. There was no pledge drive this year because there was to be a focus on the capital campaign.

#### c. Worship:

- i. Congregant question Do we every look for comparison bids on the flowers? Brian said we use the company in town and haven't done comparisons at this time and that when flowers are unsponsored the church covers it.
- d. Music: Reduction due to piano purchase in 2022 that doesn't need to occur in 2023. KOTK line item has an error. It says \$0 for 2023 when it should say \$400.
- e. Children/Youth/Family: Lower amount for high school line item because this year is the Boundary Waters trip which is less expensive than the plans for the 2022 trip.
  - i. Congregant question What hours do Joanna and Stephanie work and are these hours enough? Brian reported Joanna is 30 hours/week and Stephanie is 25/hours a week. These hours were increased in 2022 and the hope is that if it is not enough to support the services that staff would have this discussion with administration.
- f. Administrative: There are large shifts in amounts per line item within this category. This is to more consistently charge certain invoices to certain line items. And utilities line item is a substantial increase in order to keep pace with current energy bills.

  Maintenance budget is lower than it would normally be due to the hard work and talent of our property committee. We are going to try and quantify what our savings are from this work.
  - i. Congregant question Are the large shifts in the Admin line items due to trading out Services and Supplies charges? Brian answered yes.

### Finance Team/Treasurer Update

St. John's continues to have stable giving trends and strong financials. For 2023, in preparation for further PowerChurch module conversions, we voted to attribute all giving when the funds are received, rather than dividing larger giving amounts amongst all twelve months. This means that income and assets early in the year will appear higher than last year but may cause a deficit later in the year if giving doesn't remain strong. March and April giving trended lower than January and February and were below budget.

- The April 30 reconciled financials yielded the following:
  - o Giving YTD is 17% higher than last year.
  - o Total income is 18% higher than last year.
  - o Total expenses are 5% below budget.

The Finance Team and Council voted to proactively address the roughly \$37,000 deficit present in the 2023 budget by establishing the Deficit Reduction Fund. This fund is aimed at addressing the budget deficit but may serve as an emergency expense fund later in the year if giving does not meet expectations. To date, \$12,102.31 has been moved into the Deficit Reduction Fund.

\$1,270.90 has been moved to the Capital Improvement Fund this year.

#### **Human Resources**

The staff members at St. John's Lutheran Church are vital to our ministry. The Human Resources Committee (the "Committee" or the "HR Committee") is a strategic partner with St. John's Lutheran Church leadership and the Congregation and is committed to assisting in the development of a high performing staff, capable of supporting the mission of the church. The Committee's core responsibilities include maintenance of job descriptions, participation in recruitment and staffing, performance management, employee relations, investigations and disciplinary actions through termination, employee development, compensation and benefits design, budgeting and administration, Human Resource information management, regulatory compliance related to employment, Human Resources policy development and monitoring of compliance with them.

During the program year ended May 2023, the HR Committee performed a thorough review of the Human Resource Policies and Procedures, as well as the Child Protect Policy. Several updates to the Human Resources Policies and Procedures were proposed and approved by Council. As part of its ongoing diligence, the Committee also conducted an annual review of the Recognition Program and Annual Performance Appraisal process.

Throughout the program year, the Committee kept abreast of and discussed new laws and regulations pertaining to human resources including but not limited to, the Fair Labor Standards Act.

Also, during this year, the Committee assisted in job description evaluations and the selection and recruitment process for the following positions: Building Supervisor, Office Administrative Assistant, Bookkeeper and Preschool Teacher.

The HR Committee continued to monitor St. John's performance management process, which enables managers to have more robust discussions with staff about what each is doing well and how that person can be even more effective. The Committee ensured Annual Reviews and new employees' 90-Day Reviews were conducted. The performance management process at St. John's continues to be effective and enables us to serve our strategic priorities.

We look forward to continuing to work closely with Council to ensure that St. John's continues to have a high-performing staff, which serves the mission of our church at a high level. Respectfully submitted,

As reported at the Congregational meeting held in January 2023, the Endowment Committee was unable to offer any "Open-Window" campaigns throughout the previous six months due to continuing instability in the investment market. Sadly, market conditions during the first five months of this year have not improved significantly enough to be able to offer a new "Open-Window" campaign. The committee will continue to investigate other viable investment opportunities as market conditions warrant. The committee will monitor the marketplace options while safeguarding the future of the Endowment Fund and its intended purpose of outreach to worthy causes. The Endowment Fund Balance as of May 4, 2023, was \$146,496.90. During this reporting period the Fund did receive a memorial gift of \$200. Once again, donations to the fund will continue to be "The Gift That Keeps On Giving". To date the Endowment Fund has distributed in excess of \$88,000 to various charities throughout SE Wisconsin and Illinois.

We are looking for interested individuals who would enjoy working on the Endowment Committee. Beginning June 1, 2023, we have openings for two individuals willing to serve one-, two- or three-year terms. Two of our current members have served two consecutive three-year terms which is the current limit per the St. John's Constitution By-Laws. Contact Phil Lange, if interested or have questions.

### **Worship Team**

The worship life at St. John's continues to be vital. As you will read in the Music Director's report, the music during worship has been broad in its participation and gifts which is faithful to the liturgical traditions and also to the contemporary style of worship. Our new digital sound system and speakers have made a notable difference in the quality of sounds we hear.

We included skits in worship, particularly during our study of Moses, as well as videos that augment the messages and readings of the day.

Our Wednesday evening Lenten services resumed, with soup being served beforehand. We averaged 50 people who attended both.

New Christmas paraments on the altar and lectern were introduced in the Christmas season.

Our average attendance during the Sunday morning early service was around 150 people and 60 during the second. We are excited and encouraged that more people are returning to church post-Covid, and we continue to reach people at home through our livestreamed and taped services.

### Jail Ministry – "31 Years and Thriving"

In the spring of 1992, I experienced what I clearly interpreted as a call to explore the possibility of becoming involved in a jail/prison ministry. I was directed to a supervisor at the Waukesha County Jail who in turn had me call the chaplain for the St. Dismas Jail Prison Ministry – a Catholic organization which had a sound history of ministry at the jail. I was welcomed into their midst, their first non-Catholic, as they embraced the idea of becoming an ecumenical ministry. It has been a delightful and powerful collaboration ever since. Over the years about 20 of St. John's members have been part of this ministry – some have stayed for a season and some have stayed much longer. It's the kind of

ministry in which we don't just participate. We feel a nudge, a willingness to risk getting out of our comfort zone, and the courage to say yes to a call which can be life changing and incredibly fulfilling. It's been a good 31 years.

And so what is it that we do? We have the privilege of participating in and leading Sunday morning worship services at the jail. We pray together and share Holy Communion, and provide encouragement and support. We also write letters to inmates while they are at the jail and in many cases continue if they move on to prison. And we visit. These visits can occur weekly, biweekly or as needed and take place over a two-way video monitor. Families often contact us because they are unable to visit regularly. We can provide a valuable service to those who are incarcerated and who are often lonely, sad or despairing and provide a ray of hope through listening, conversation and encouragement.

Four separate group programs are conducted at the jail which we help facilitate. These include traditional Bible Study groups for men and women and a group targeted for women with substance abuse issues. And there's so much more.

We provide an early childhood education experience to our church members and to the community with a staff dedicated to sharing the love of God to these beloved children of God. Ours is proudly a diverse community both culturally and with the skills, gifts, and challenges of our children. We continue to welcome children with special needs and challenges and where they can learn and grow receiving the attention they may need and cannot receive in other preschools.

#### 2022-2023 Preschool Year Highlights:

In our Two-Year-Old class, our team teachers, Mary Wagner and Lana DeCoto, enjoyed the eagerness of eight children playing and learning as their first classroom experience. This year we had two friends "graduate" from this class into the Three-Year-Old class because we respect each child as an individual and partner with parents regarding their preschooler's progress. We continue to be successful in enrolling children throughout the school year after their second birthday.

Our Three-Year-Old class with eighteen children, taught by the team of Mary and Lana, once again showed us how children their age make friends and create special friendships. And they showed us how they grow each in their own way. Their age-appropriate learning skills are introduced and practiced every day in a fun, fast-paced and nurturing learning environment.

Our Four-Year-Old class with eight eager learners was led by our newest teacher, LaBree Paukner. We were blessed to have LaBree join our staff having been a Four-Year-Old class parent last school year. She has brought "new to us" learning experiences to her classroom along with our time-tested curriculum. Our families appreciate the opportunity to use our class as either their child's Four-Year-Old experience and then move on to public school 5K, or to attend our Preschool and then enter their school's 4K class. We are confident that each child is well-prepared for their next step after this year of our Playing to Learn curriculum.

#### Preschool Looking Ahead to 2023-2024:

We are busy with enrollment for the upcoming school year. We are proud of our reputation within the community and how our families refer others to us.

What a pleasure to have LaBree Paukner join St. John's Preschool bringing fresh, new teaching ideas and prospectives not only to her Four-Year-Old class, but to all the Preschool staff.

This summer will be busy with LaBree bringing her previous Physical Education teaching experience to creating a Guided Large Muscle curriculum for those days when Preschoolers can't play outdoors in the Outdoor Learning Center. It will truly be "Playing with a Purpose." Mary Wagner and Lana DeCoto as team teachers will work this summer with organizing curriculum for our Two- and Three-Year-Old classes and creating new teaching units from the wealth of materials St. John's Preschool is blessed to have.

The Preschool office is open throughout the summer preparing for the upcoming school year. This summer's Vacation Bible School Preschool program is being written and taught by Laura Rickinger and Lana DeCoto using the framework of a typical Preschool day. It will be five days of Seeds of Change created just for our youngest learners.

#### Children's Ministries

Sunday School had a great year! This is our 8th year utilizing the Large Group/Small Group format.

Children gather first in Large Group, where they experience music, stewardship, the lesson and prayers all together as a group. Families often attend this time together and several families have now dubbed this time as "kids church". Then students ages 2-5<sup>th</sup> grade head to Small Groups where they build peer relationships and expand on the lesson.

The benefits of this framework are that it allows us the freedom to be highly creative in how we present the lesson and allows for greater volunteerism and family participation. It also provides an environment for children with specific needs to fully participate in (and enjoy) Sunday School in areas where they may struggle in a traditional format.

#### Highlights and milestones of the year include:

- Sunday School enrollment of approx. 60 children.
- Five new families were welcomed to Sunday School this year.
- Four students received their First Communion.
- Bible Distribution to our preschoolers and 3<sup>rd</sup> graders.
- Over 15 Youth/Adult volunteers (Large Group team, Small Group leaders, planning teams)
- Collaboration with the Confirmation students in a Youth Leadership Team on Sunday mornings
- Stewardship Projects brought in over \$1000 in funds as we focused on local & world hunger, our Los Heroes students, and of course, the Penny Wars.
- Fall study of Moses and Lenten study of Paul's Journeys.
- Impromptu Christmas Pageant.
- Participation in the Reformation Village and St. John's 60<sup>th</sup> Anniversary.
- A 12-week unit on the Books of the Bible.

#### Concerns

Our current Sunday Morning timeframe does not always allow adequate time for families to transition from worship to Sunday School and adds time pressures to all Sunday morning programming.

Additionally, we have a growing need for leaders and volunteers. Have an hour or two to spare a few times a month? Join us for our new Friday Morning Work Crew beginning in July as we prepare for the upcoming year!

#### Family worship

Building upon the successful pilot of an Interactive Family Worship in the spring of 2021, we continue to offer Family Worship at our 10:30 service. This worship incorporates components of our traditional Large Group Sunday School time within the Contemporary Worship framework. We add the occasional song movements, an interactive Family Lesson or Children's Sermon, coloring and crafts, a Family Blessing, and we offer an optional activity for children during the sermon.

We were excited to offer monthly Family Fun nights which provided a fun time of fellowship for the entire congregation. We also rejoiced with the return of Music Camp in June and Vacation Bible School in July. For VBS we partnered with Lutherdale Bible Camp and welcomed 4 Lutherdale counselors to run day long programming for our families.

#### Summer of 2023

This summer we are happy to offer Amazing Notes Music Camp in June, Seeds of Change VBS in July along with two Family Fun Nights.

### Middle School Ministry, 5th-8th grade

Our Middle School Ministries consist of approximately 38 students in 5th-8th grade. Our 5th & 6th grade students participate in a two-year Bible Overview Class and our 7th & 8th grade students are invited to participate in the Confirmation program. This is an age group that thrives with in person programming, and we were excited to create their own space for them downstairs in the Paul Room. We were excited to partner with our High School Youth this year to again offer weekly Sunday evening programming and meals for all our students. We welcomed new families and saw students reconnect and strengthen relationships with each other and St. John's.

**5th & 6th grade Pre-Confirmation** students participated in a twice monthly Bible Overview class on Sunday evenings taught by Karie Zach and Joanna Salinas using the Sparkhouse Connect Curriculum. This is a two-year program and this year we studied the New Testament.

Our 7<sup>th</sup> & 8<sup>th</sup> grade Confirmation Students participated in twice monthly instruction on Sunday evenings taught by Pastor Brian and Joanna Salinas. This year we explored worship, Lutheran history, prayer, the life of Jesus, and big faith questions.

Fellowship is also a critical component to our Middle School Ministry. In addition to our Sunday evening meals, we hosted monthly Fellowship events including Game Nights, serving at the Hope Center, ice skating and pizza, outings to area venues, the ropes course at Lutherdale, and service opportunities at St. Johns. In November several of our students participated in the Reformation Village and we have students participating each week in the Youth Leadership Team.

This summer, we will continue to connect with students during our Family Fun Nights, service opportunities, and as Camp Counselors during VBS.

### **High School and College**

#### Summer Trip 2022:

Eight high school youth went to Savannah, Georgia to work in the community with the Youthworks program. While in Savannah the young adults had the opportunity to work on homes for those in the community unable to do it for themselves, help out at food banks, work on organizing a new homeless shelter that was opening, as well as other needs in the community. While we were there the youth also had the opportunity to learn more about the city of Savannah and its history as well as build relationships with one another and other youth from churches across the US.

#### **Youth Group:**

This year we continued with the Sunday Evening Youth Group that we began implementing last year. We begin each group with the opportunity to have dinner here at church before youth group starts. The number of students greatly varied throughout the year depending on the youth's other activities and sports. On average we had between 4-9 youth each Sunday. Besides gathering on Sunday evenings, we tried to get together at least once a month for an outside gathering to build relationships. These included things such as mini golf and escape rooms.

#### 9th Grade Confirmation:

This year we adapted the model for our 9<sup>th</sup> grade confirmation program. Rather than the students having a one-on-one mentor, we had group mentors who were able to make lasting relationships with all of the youth in the program. For the first half of the program year, we focused on comparative religions. We kicked off this by digging deeper into our own faith and had Bishop Erickson come to our Lutherdale retreat, where he had a very thought-provoking conversation with our students. We then had speakers of other religions come to our monthly meetings and teach the students about their faith.

Then after they learned about the faith, we had the opportunity to go to their place of worship and participate in a worship experience. We had 11 students get confirmed in May.

### Young Adults:

In an attempt to stay connected with our current college students and young adults. The High School Youth created and sent out care packages during the year, as well as sent cards at other times.

### **Adult Ministry Team**

It was a great privilege to have Dan as our guest and to hear about the work of our church in addressing hunger issues around the world and, of course, responding to both natural and human influenced disasters.

St. John's has a very long history of supporting ELCA Hunger Appeal and Disaster Relief in a big way. In 2022, we donated over \$8,000 to the ELCA Hunger Appeal. Since 2012, direct giving to this effort totaled just under \$100,000.

#### **Newborn Kits**

In 2022, St. John's assembled and donated 600 Newborn Kits. Over the past 24 years, St. John's has donated a total of 12,442 Newborn Kits!

We partner with Global Health Ministries in Minnesota. They ship the kits to various developing nations in Africa, Asia, and Central America. Newborn Kits are gifts that help a new mom celebrate her baby and help her clothe and care for her child. Importantly, the kits are also used by overseas partners to encourage young women to seek prenatal care during pregnancy, greatly improving their chances for a healthy, happy outcome. Once that connection is made, they can also encourage postnatal care, including vaccinations and well-baby checks that can help a newborn thrive.

Our goal for 2023 is 600 kits. Newborn Kits will be assembled in July. Each kit contains a towel, wash cloth, receiving blanket, onesie/shirt, baby hat, Ivory Soap (bath bar), two cloth diapers, and two diaper pins.

About \$3000.00 is needed in monetary donations to purchase the diapers, diaper pins, towels, and wash cloths and to help offset the cost to deliver the kits to Minnesota. In the past, our mission received \$500-\$600 from the Holiday Bazaar proceeds. Those funds were received this year, but this

is the last year. We've also received \$1000.00 from St. John's Endowment Fund for the past few years. I do not know if we will get those funds again this year.

Other items are purchased & donated by members/friends of our mission. Depending on sales/deals, each kit costs about \$10.00 - \$12.00, for a total cost of \$6000.00 - \$7200.00 each year! St. John's members are so generous!

### Refugee Resettlement

In 2022, SJLC co-sponsored a refugee family from Afghanistan. Initially, over 20 SJLC members volunteered to work with and on behalf of a family coming to the US after the August 2021 evacuation of Afghan people from Kabul. SJLC ended up co-sponsoring a family of 8. A team of six members continued to work with the Karimi family and assist with ESL training. Additionally, SJLC assisted the family with needed household items including a floor rug, vacuum, bookcase, clothing, and miscellaneous kitchen items. The family is doing very well. The father and two 20- year-old young men all have jobs in Waukesha. The two teenage girls and 12-year-old boy are now in their second full year of school here in Milwaukee and doing very well with their English. The baby girl who has Down's Syndrome is thriving, and the mother, too, is managing all the family comings and goings well. She is a marvelous cook. The family has done so well that there is no longer a need for assistance from SJLC.

Additionally, donated household items not needed by the family were well received by a newly arriving refugee family of seven from Myanmar. A few items LSS could not use went to the Hope Center. Thank you, everyone, for providing so many wonderful household items and furnishings.

#### **PARTNERSHIP**

We continue to make new and cultivate ongoing relationships with our Tanzanian brothers and sisters in Christ. Since June 2022, there have been leadership changes in their church. Their partnership committee has all new members. Four are children of former members. In January, we welcomed a new pastor-in-charge, Franaely Issangya. Pastor Issangya is the pastor at Akeri and one other parish, and the District Pastor. He has numerous responsibilities but manages to keep us updated on current happenings via WhatsApp. He has two young children, Filbert, Felicia, and wife, Niwael.

#### **DELEGATION**

Deborah, Andy, and Gail Rennie led a delegation of fifteen to Tanzania from Feb 28 through Mar 12. The group consisted of Pastor Brian Halverson, his daughter, Eliza, Jim and Gail Mathis, Chris and Pam Klink, Dawn Williams, Patrice Krimplebein, former members Al and Janell Schmidt, and Doug and Mary Dehler, members of Galilee Lutheran Church, Pewaukee.

Our goal was to spend time in the community, learn about their daily life, foster new relationships, and spend time with students and teachers at Akeri Hope English Medium school. We submersed ourselves into the community. We witnessed and heard the struggles they endure; visited and learned about other successful projects; and got comfortable with being uncomfortable. This part of the trip is challenging, and our group took it all in with open hearts.

#### **SCHOOL**

The Lead Teacher, Samson Sikawa, has been on staff at the school since the beginning. He is a humble and devoted leader. Samson is respected by the school board, school staff, and the students. He and his wife welcomed their first child this past year. We recognized teachers who were at Akeri Hope during our 2018 visit, and met new ones, witnessing them collectively working hard in their devotion to their students' futures.

The school is thriving, not only in the number of students, but also in testing. Every Class 7 since the school opened, has passed the state exam, ensuring their acceptance into secondary school. The students are learning about what careers they could have if they continue their education, so they have a greater purpose in their studies. Since June of last year, enrollment has increased from 259 to 285.

Our delegation spent one day in the classrooms, reading, crafting, playing, singing, and building. The students speak clear English and cherish their time with us.

#### THE FUTURE

Our goals this coming year include walking along side our partners in prayer and encouragement; communicating on a regular basis; sharing news to St. John's more consistently; and helping them use our monetary gifts in an impactful way – specifically, increasing teacher salaries. We will also be planning our next visit for 2025. Karibu Sana! (You are very welcome!)

### All Peoples Gathering Church, Milwaukee

Our partnership with All Peoples is 31 years old! We share a lot of history, life, and love together.

- Backpacks & School Supplies SJLC continues to be a strong partner for this annual latesummer campaign which enabled All Peoples to give 271 backpacks, filled with a complete supply of items required for their grade levels, to students in Kindergarten through High School.
- Food Justice a faithful team from SJLC delivers overstock of food from the Waukesha Food Pantry to the All Peoples Food Pantry. The pantry is set up as a shopping experience where guests are assisted in selecting items which work for their family situations. Families can also choose books and Bibles to take home.
- Thanksgiving Pies SJLC provides apple pies for many of the 100 Thanksgiving food baskets given out by All Peoples in the community.
- Christmas Food Baskets SJLC provided grocery bags filled with items needed by families to create their Christmas feasts. This ministry served 100 families in 2022.
- Winter Wear SJLC collected new and gently used children/youth jackets and accessories in early fall. All Peoples created a gift bag with a coat, hat, scarf, and gloves in sizes newborn through Men's XXL and distributed them in early November. In 2022, 201 coat bags were given to children.
- Financial Support SJLC continues to support All Peoples as one of 3 partnerships through benevolence giving. As one of All Peoples original mission partners, St. John's made a financial commitment to support All Peoples for 10 years. In an abundance of grace and love, St. John's has kept this commitment over 3 decades.

At the end of 2022, Mary Mueller stepped down after serving as the All Peoples ministry leader for several years. We are so grateful to Mary for the years of faithful service. And, we are looking for someone who has a heart for urban ministry and our dear partner to assist us in continuing this important partnership. ### Héroes of the Faith, El Salvador

The Education for Life El Salvador Scholarship Program continues to be the main focus of this partnership as we support and bless the children of Los Héroes and their families. The Salvadoran school year runs from mid-January to late October-early November. During the 2022 school year, there were 61 students in the program. Scholarship amounts are different for each grade level. Kindergarteners (8) and Elementary students, first-fifth (17) receive \$150, Middle School students, 6<sup>th</sup>-9<sup>th</sup> grade, (21) receive \$275, High school students (12) receive \$580 and University students (3) receive \$1,250. We also provide additional scholarships for university students who need partial help to complete their degrees. In 2022, five students were granted partial scholarships based on need. Other costs associated with the program include the administration coordinator fee, tithing to the El Salvadorian Lutheran Church, preschool teacher salary and graduation fees. In total the program cost was just over \$40,000. Funding is provided through gifts from sponsors and the church budget.

Scholarships for the 2023 school year will increase slightly due to inflation and rising costs. Transportation costs have more than doubled this pass year which impacts our students getting to and from school.

In addition to the scholarships, school kits are supplied for each student and are funded by St John's. Supplies are purchased here and assembled in El Salvador. School kits are handed out in January of each new school year.

There are three opportunities for sponsors to communicate with their students. Tim and Linda Muth travel back and forth from the US to El Salvador and act as our couriers and translators.

Health and Day's for Girls support consist of financial, first aid supplies, fabric and sewing supplies.

Pastor Brian traveled to El Salvador in November for the International Gathering of Companion Synods. He had a chance to visit Los Héroes, make new friends and preach during worship. Since the onset of the pandemic, St John's members have participated in online prayer groups with folks from Los Heroes. Sharing prayer concerns online and in Sunday worship continues to be a life-giving way in which we accompany one another.

Pastor Santiago continues as head Pastor of our sister church, Los Héroes de la Fe in Los Héroes, El Salvador. Pastor Francisco continues to be the administrator of the Education for Life Scholarship Program in El Salvador and Pastor Sonia Fuentes (who was ordained in 2022) oversees the church, Sunday school and the Days for Girls kits.

#### WHAT'S HAPPENING IN EL SALVADOR IN 2023?

Los Héroes began 2023 with strategic planning activities. The congregation identified 4 focal ministries for the year and formed 4 commissions with identified leaders. On the first Sunday of the month, the pastoral team and council meet to share breakfast and plan for the month. After worship on first Sundays, the whole congregation meets, with each member participating in one of the 4 commission meetings. Throughout the month, the commissions work together to sponsor special activities. Some activities which have already taken place in 2023 include distribution of school kits,

weight-lifting day at church, community clean-up days and a sleepover at the church to celebrate the 27th anniversary of the community.

#### **Pastoral Care Commission**

Led by Pastor Santiago; work includes worship content, baptism and confirmation education, online prayer groups and devotions, and home visits.

#### **Health and Healing Commission**

Led by Pastor Sonia and Linda; work includes Sunday wellness events, health education at the church, Days for Girls washable menstruation kit sewing project, reproductive education and Days for Girls kit distribution in local schools, development of a health resource space in the church.

#### **Care for the Environment Commission**

Led by Jocelyn and Tim; work includes coordination with the new Los Héroes Community Civil Protection Team to identify and mitigate risks related to nature, infrastructure, behaviors, and family situations; community clean-up projects, modeling good practices as the church, assisting elders

#### **Holistic Education Commission**

Led by Pastor Francisco and Karla; work includes supporting the Family Circle (church preschool program), Sunday School and Education for Life program, development of more education opportunities for youth and adults to do Bible study, encourage adults to keep learning
