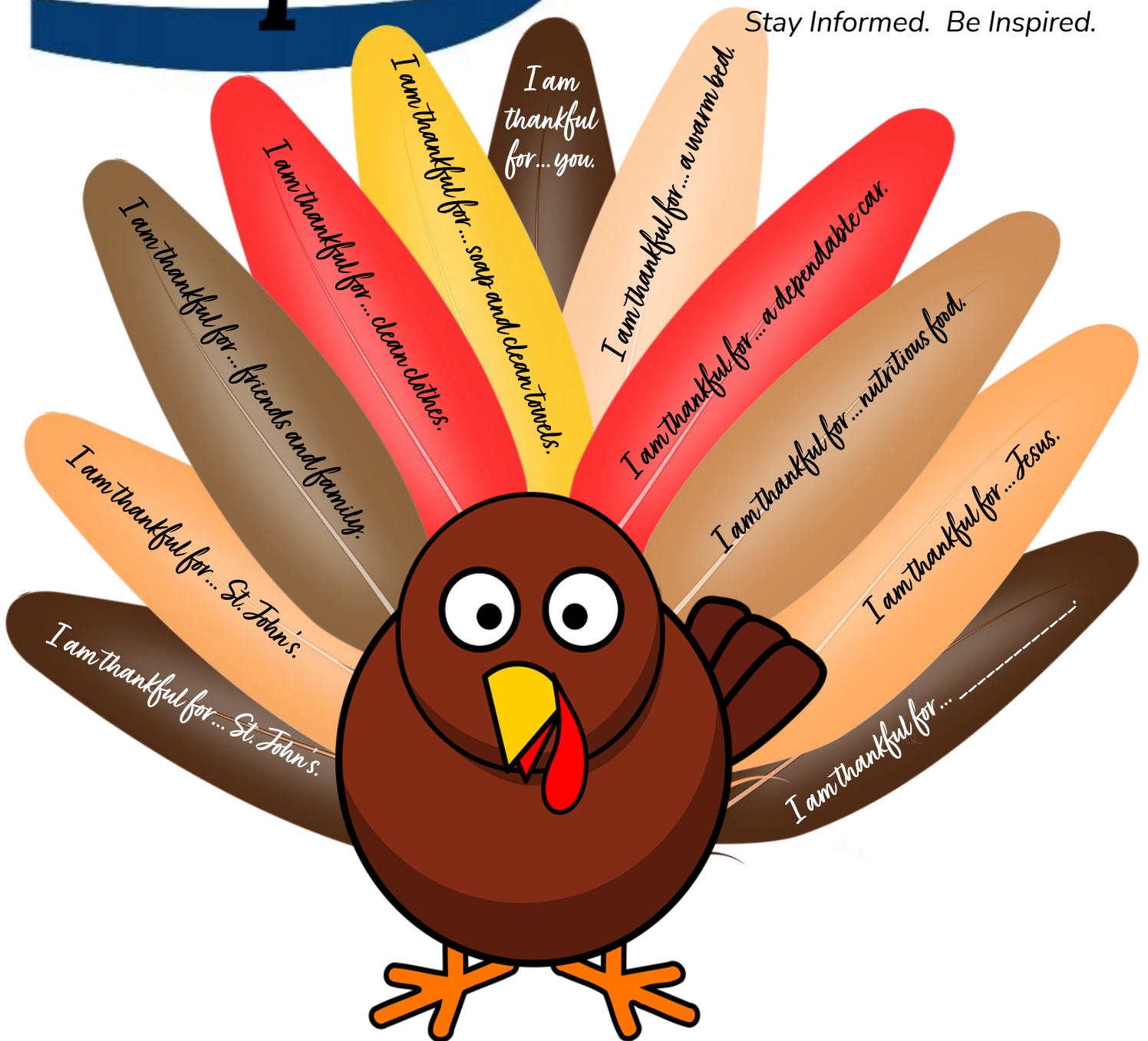

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Pastor Ponders: What Are Human Beings?

Psalms 8:3-6

*When I look at your heavens, the work of your fingers,
the moon and the stars that you have established;
What are human beings that you are mindful of them,
mortals that you care for them?
Yet you have made them a little lower than God,
and crowned them with glory and honor.
You have given them dominion over the works of your hands.*

What are human beings? What an interesting question for the psalmist to ask. The Bible teaches us who God is, but it also has things to say about who we humans are.

God is clearly described as generous. The Bible begins with Genesis telling us God created and continues to sustain us and the world in which we live. God became Jesus in order to give his life for us. Romans 5:8 says: God proves his love for us in that while we still were sinners Christ died for us. Through Christ, we receive unlimited forgiveness, mercy and grace. And through the Holy Spirit, we receive spiritual gifts for community living: peace, patience, kindness, self-control, and so on.

The Bible, including Psalm 8, also teaches who we are as human beings. We are “a little lower than God” yet given “dominion over the works of your hands.” Perhaps the most important word we have to describe the relationship we humans have with God and the rest of God’s creation is this one: stewards. We were created by God to manage what belongs to God. God generously gives to

you, that you might receive with gratitude (1 Timothy 4:4). God generously gives to you with hopes that you assume responsibility to manage what you’ve received in a way that would please God. In a Matthew 25 parable, those who manage well are told, “Well done, good and faithful servant.” “Little lower than God” implies more of a partnership in caring for this world.

Your understanding of this word can impact your decisions, how you manage your finances, or spend your time. This month we’ll be reflecting on this word “steward” in worship, in our annual financial pledges to support the ministry of St John’s, in hosting an indoor Winter Market, and celebrating our nation’s Day of Thanksgiving.

When an ELCA congregation is faced with a pastoral change, the synod directs them to create a team to help assess the church's identity, community, mission. The team collects and analyzes information and input to help guide decision-making during a call process.

The St. Johns Mission Exploration Team (MET) has gathered several times in the last month, including a session with Pastor Kristin Nielson from the synod office. Our first action is to collect information from you, our members. To do this, during the month of November, each individual member is invited and encouraged to complete the MET survey (online and hardcopy if needed). Questions will center around our mission, what it means to be a member, strengths, opportunities, challenges, resource needs and how we can best impact the community around us. Our goal is to gather your open and honest input in order to determine high-level themes. With these themes, we plan to dive deeper and meet with as many members as possible (cottage sessions and focus groups). Your input is needed and valued!

The survey is available from November 1 – 21. Click or scan this QR code to take the survey.

Here is a general timeline of the MET activities. It is early in the process...so this might change.

- November – survey is live - collecting input
- December – analyze responses; determine themes; hold 1-2 cottage sessions
- January – hold more cottage sessions and focus groups
- February – MET team works together on analysis and developing our report
- March – report is finalized, presented to the congregation

4. **Return your tube to the GIANT M&M display** in the narthex by the end of November.

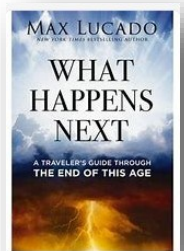

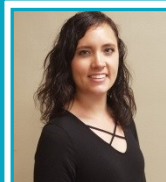

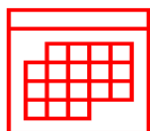


Join Us for ADVENT FEST

All Saints' Day

What is All Saints' Day?

All Saints' Day, also known as All Hallows' Day, is a Christian holiday that is observed on November 1 in Western Christianity. All Saints' Day is a Christian memorial day celebrating the honor of all church saints, whether known or unknown. It is a day set aside to honor all the saints who have lived righteous and holy lives in accordance with Christian teachings. All Saints' Day is part of a broader tradition that includes All Hallows' Eve (Halloween) on October 31 and All Souls' Day on November 2.

The origin of All Saints' Day can be traced back to the early Christian Church when it was established as a day to remember and celebrate the martyrs and other saints who had died for their faith. Over time, the scope of the holiday expanded to include martyrs and all faithful Christians who had lived pious and virtuous lives. It is a day to recognize the saints' collective witness and express gratitude for their example.

In the Western Christian Church, Pope Gregory III (731-741) is often credited with establishing November 1 as the date for All Saints' Day. This date was chosen to coincide with the dedication of a chapel in St. Peter's Basilica in Rome to "All the Saints." It was an attempt to unify the various local celebrations of saints' feast days and set a universal date for honoring all the saints.

The Christian festival of All Saints Day comes from a conviction that there is a spiritual connection between those in Heaven and on Earth. While traditions across the globe vary for All Saints' Day, the common theme is a celebration with family and remembrance of those who have passed. ¹

For Lutherans, All Saints resonates with the conviction that in Christ every saint is a sinner and every sinner a saint, *simul justus et peccator*. Lutherans especially remember on this feast that it is God's grace, apart from our works, that makes us saints. We find lasting rest only in the mercy of God. All Saints begins a season in which we contemplate the hopes and fears of all creation, watching and waiting for signs of a new day dawning for all of us. All Saints reimagines the world—all of it. Even in death, God is making all things new. ²

Council Communications

The meeting was held on Monday, October 20, 2025.

Finances: Although giving was below the anticipated amount in September by 16%, giving for the year is still 6% over the budgeted amount, which is good news.

Funds were transferred from Waukesha State Bank to Summit Credit Union and deposited there in a thirteen-month CD. This was done to bring our balance at Waukesha State Bank under the amount protected by the FDIC, so all church funds are fully insured.

Pastor's Report: The Mission Exploration Team (MET) has met several times. A timeline of its work will be made available to the congregation and the congregation will be regularly informed of what the MET is doing.

The Stewardship Committee will be sending out a mailing to the congregation. Several Sundays in November will focus on the importance of our giving for 2026.

Two members of the council will meet with Heidi Bischmann to discuss questions about the draft of our new facility use policy.

President's Report: The council discussed and approved the 2026 paid holiday schedule for church staff and the recommendation from the Human Resources Committee about 2026 staff salary increases.

Property Committee: The mold abatement work, approved at the September council meeting, has been completed.

We had a good turnout for the September 29 church clean-up day.

"Pave the Way" Update: Brian Zach gave an update to the congregation at the worship services on October 19 about progress on getting approval for a new electronic sign on the church property.

Old Business: An attorney has been contacted and given the congregation legal advice on dealing with the GFL disposal contract.

The council discussed the request from a local scout troop about using the church facilities and having a relationship with St. John's. Several questions were raised about the specifics of this request for space usage and scheduling. There will be follow-up discussions with the scout leaders to make sure we are all clear on these before a decision is made.

Approval was given to spend funds for a video switcher upgrade which will help with our AV technology in worship and online.
